Dear members of the Wesley Community,

We have been discussing fostering Sanctuary Culture here at Wesley for several months now, identifying ways that we can make this church a sanctuary for all who enter its doors. The word sanctuary can carry deeply political connotations, but it can also call to mind spiritual and even literary ideals.

Some of you may not know this, but after I graduated from college here in Worcester I spent a year studying about blind organists in Paris, France. One of the organists at Notre-Dame Cathedral – the famous church of "The Hunchback" – is blind, so I passed a great amount of time up in the organ loft with Jean-Pierre Leguay, even playing a concert there on Ascension Sunday. So when I think of churches and sanctuary, I immediately call to mind Quasimodo rescuing his beloved Esmeralda and swinging her to sanctuary within the stone Gothic walls.

On a spiritual level, I think we are seeking a sanctuary from the outside world that can be so detrimental to life and wholesomeness. Much of contemporary life fosters persistent inner voices of judgment, depression, disconnection from our bodies, suspicion of foreigners, and addiction to technologies and social media, to name but a few contemporary yuckies to the eternal classics like fear, greed, and ignorance. What does it mean for Wesley to be a sanctuary from these causes of suffering? When you think of the future of this building and this community, what do you see? We often think of the technological future; I wonder what would happen if we envisioned the future – with Wesley as our focal point – in terms of the developments made in human understanding, in fostering communication skills, and in establishing sustainable community practices for spiritual and nutritional nourishment. I think we are building towards this future with every act of worship when we come together and try to weave together our shared hopes and aspirations in prayer and song.

The summer time is here, and my shoulders relax as the rehearsal schedule slows down for a few months. I would love to use the time to make contact with those of you who have a love of music but don't know where you might fit in. Do you love to play an instrument or sing a style of music that you haven't seen represented here in worship? Is there a kind of music you would like me to know about?

If you said yes to any of these questions, please send me an e-mail or call me at church (<u>climbingorganist@wesleyworc.org</u>). Let's schedule a time for you to stop by my office, have some tea, and either make some music, listen to some music, or discuss some music together. It's an exciting time to dream big for the fall.

REFLECTIONS FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

As some of you may know, my call to ordained ministry came when I was working with the United Way in Lycoming County PA. I was serving as the Director of Community Building and Funds Distribution. I was part of a team that was committed to community problem solving as we sought to address the variety of human and social problems facing our communities. Because I was working with an organization that provided funding and did not provide any direct services, part of my job was to connect with the many different human service agencies and nonprofit organizations that were doing good work in our community. I had the privilege of looking at the work they were doing and seeking to connect resources and assets in new and creative ways to address the problems our community faced. I loved my job and I felt that I was making a difference in the world.

I left the United Way because, in my calling, I heard God say to me that, as a person of faith who cares about the world, I was being given a unique calling to bear witness to the reality that God is (and should be) at the center of the work we do to make this world a better place. In my work with the United Way it was clear that the role of religion, faith, and spirituality in transforming lives was really never a consideration. If a church or faith-based organization was a part of our network of services, they often lamented the fact that, in order to receive government funding, they were always asked to refrain from "proselytizing." This fear of proselytizing inevitably led many churches to feel like they couldn't even share their faith in any meaningful way.

I came into the ministry with a hope and desire to live out of my faith and commitment to God and neighbor, and to employ the riches of my faith toward making a better world. However, I find that I am still wrestling with the questions I had back when I was wrestling with the call. One question that often plagues me is this: what is (or should be) the difference between a church that gives out free clothing and a secular non-profit organization that does the same? In a situation like that, what is our unique calling and what unique gift do we have to offer people as a church? We are not a *secular* non-profit organization. We are a church. But, what does that mean?

These and other questions come up time after time. The Bible says, "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have." (1 Peter 3:15) I would be curious to hear from you about how you would respond to my questions. What makes (or should make) our social service ministries uniquely different from those you might find in a secular nonprofit agency? I am a co-learner with you and want to learn from you.

A MESSAGE FROM SPRC

After prayerful discernment, Jean Grant has decided to step down as Children's Christian Education Director, effective at the end of August, after the Vacation Bible School this summer. The Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) accepts this resignation with regret and with a deep sense of gratitude for Jean's significant contributions to our children's ministries over the last three years. Under Jean's leadership, the weekly Sunday School, seasonal pageants, and Vacation Bible School programs have been an important part of Wesley's ministries for our church family and the wider community. Jean reports that with her longtime goal of writing coming to fruition over the past year, combined with family obligations, that stepping down is the best option at this time. The SPRC would like to take the opportunity now to thank Jean for her ministry and leadership at Wesley, which will continue in other ways as she and her family remain members of the church. There will be opportunities for the congregation to thank Jean Grant again later in the summer.

The SPRC will be seeking input from the congregation about our ministries for children, youth and families in the coming weeks and months as Wesley plans for the future.



DID YOU KNOW?

Each week during worship the prayers of the people usually incorporate prayer requests submitted by members of the congregation, and the Sunday News and Herald always include a list of prayer concerns thus enabling us to continue to pray for each other's concerns throughout the week. When we pray for others we are participating in what is known as intercessory prayer. The English verb intercede derives from the Latin *intercedere* "to go between".

The Bible contains many examples of this type of prayer. In the Old Testament many of the psalms are in the form of intercessions, and the prophets often offered intercessory prayer on behalf of the Israelites. In the New Testament Jesus instructs his followers to pray even on behalf of their enemies. John 17 records how Jesus himself offered intercessory prayer for his disciples (and all future believers) on the night on which he was betrayed. Jesus also offers the ultimate example of intercession when he prayed for those who crucified him: "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." (Luke 23:34)

Intercessory prayer is one of the most common forms of prayer, and often in our formal liturgy we pray for God to intervene not only in the lives of the members of the congregation but also in our communities and the world. As members of a Christian community we are called to continue to pray for others not only during worship but during our own private prayer time during the week. Our prayer for others affects not only the lives and hearts of those for whom we pray, but such prayer also transforms us as we grow in faith and discipleship.


