FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Be the Light that Christmas Brings!

Read: John 1:1-14,16

The gospel of John reminds us that, in the beginning was the Word. The Word became flesh and lived among us, and the Word was the Light of the world. For four weeks in advent, we enact the kind of waiting and watching that characterizes our hope for the coming of the Messiah. As we wait with expectant hope, we remember that what God does on Christmas is the fulfilment of God's promise to bring light into darkened lives and a darkened world.

On Christmas we celebrate the advent of the Light. This Light is the hope of the world, made manifest for all the world to see. On the silent night, the holy night of Christmas Eve, we will remember what God did to send his son, and we will remember how God is still at work. We remember that God is Emmanuel—God with us—and that means that the Light of the world is now in us, for God has made us light after Jesus, whose love and life is now in and among us.

On Christmas we are therefore called to look within and look around and see what the Lord has done. God has made us reflections of the true light that shines upon the world. And you are the light shining in the darkness now. So, in this season, you are called to be the light you want to see in the world. Because Jesus is the Light shining in our lives, he makes us light after himself when he says, "you are the light of the world." So, this Christmas, be the light you want to see in the world.

Be the light that Christmas brings. Begin at home. Begin at work. Begin in the community. Begin in this very church because you are now his witnesses! You are the hope that Christmas brings - do not let the despairing of this world discourage you! You are the peace that Christmas brings - do not let the turmoil of this world suppress you! You are the love that Christmas brings - do not let the hate of this world repress you! You are the joy that Christmas brings - do not let the sorrows of this world restrain you. You are the light of the world - do not let the darkness of this world overcome you.

Be the light that Christmas brings!

CHRISTIAN FORMATION OPPORTUNITIES AT WESLEY

“Welcoming the Light” is this Fourth Week of Advent’s worship theme, and the practice we invite you to is Imaginative Prayer. St. Francis of Assisi encouraged people to create nativity scenes at Christmas to imagine the holy family as living people (an early form of imaginative prayer). This practice is briefly outlined below...

- ◊ Settle in a comfortable and quiet spot. Prepare to spend some time in imaginative prayer. You might open your hands on your lap and ask God to open your heart and imagination, and invite the Christ Child into your heart.
- ◊ Read the Christmas Nativity story from Luke...Luke 2:1-20. As you read, imagine yourself in the story. In your mind's eye, look around the scene that you are in and take it all in...What is around you? Who else is there? What do I hear, smell, touch in the scene? What is the mood of the scene—tense, joyful, confused, angry? What is the meaning of this scene for your life? After reading the story and spending time in imaginative prayer “in” the scene, spend some time in silent reflection.
- ◊ Close your time by re-reading the last verse of the story...Luke 2:20. “The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.” What does it mean for your life? How does the incarnation of the Christ Child in our hearts call for us to daily “glorify and praise God” in the world?

## DID YOU KNOW?

As mentioned in a previous article there is only one Christmas hymn by Charles Wesley in *The United Methodist Hymnal*. However, that one Christmas carol is so generally known and loved that many people don't even realize that it comes from our Methodist heritage. It is in fact one of the most popular Christmas carols ever written and has the distinction of being one of only two carols included every year in the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols at King's College, Cambridge. "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing" (UMH 240) was originally entitled "Hymn for Christmas Day" and published in 1739 as part of a collection called *Hymns and Sacred Poems*. And the first line of that hymn as written by Wesley was "Hark, how all the welkin rings," not the now familiar "Hark, the herald angels sing." It was Wesley's friend and perhaps less well-known co-founder of Methodism, Anglican priest George Whitefield, who altered the text of the opening line and published it in his 1753 *Collection*. He likely saving the text from obscurity, as the term "welkin" (defined variously as firmament, vault of heaven, celestial sphere) was a poetic term rarely used even in Wesley's time. Over the years there have been many other revisions of the text; most recently our 1989 *United Methodist Hymnal* embraces changes eliminating gender exclusive language.

In the same way that we cannot imaging singing the text of this beloved carol without Whitefield's altered first line, most of us would find it hard to imagine singing it to any other tune than MENDELSSOHN, the "traditional" tune with which it is paired in our hymnal. As the tune name suggests, the melody was written by Felix Mendelssohn (and later adapted and arranged by William H. Cummings.) It was not written, however, as a hymn tune—it was originally the melody of a chorus in a cantata composed by Mendelssohn in 1840 to commemorate the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Gutenberg's invention of mechanical movable type printing. Cummings adapted the tune for Wesley's text in 1856, and it first appeared in American Methodist hymnals in 1878.

Believe it or not, one of the tunes with which this text has been paired beginning in 1754 is the tune now known as EASTER HYMN, the tune to which we sing another Wesley text "Christ the Lord is Risen Today" (UMH 302). In fact the 1966 *Methodist Hymnal* printed "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing" with both tunes. In a way the pairing of the text with what we consider to be an Easter tune highlights the broad theological scope of this text, for "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" does more than tell the Christmas story. Described in *Companion to the United Methodist Hymnal* as an "extraordinary hymn on humankind's re-creation, reformation, and reconciliation in the life and witness of Jesus Christ," this text encapsulates the entire Gospel message.


