

## DISCERNING PRIORITIES TOGETHER

*"To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good."*

~ 1 Corinthians 12:7

Here at Wesley we value (1) *spiritual growth*; (2) *hospitality, welcome & inclusion*; (3) *diversity & multiculturalism*; (4) *mission & outreach*; and (5) *lay leadership development & empowerment*. These are our five areas of passion—our values. And so, in light of these values we want to ask you:

- a. What have we done in the last several years—and what are we currently doing—that has enabled us to live into the above-mentioned five areas of passion?
- b. What do you want to see happen at Wesley over the next 3 years to move us even closer to embodying these five areas of passion more fully?
- c. What do we need to be doing—and what are *you* willing to do—in order to move us closer to living into these five areas of passion more deeply?

The Church Council and I are inviting you to help us answer these questions as part of our discernment and planning process. On **Sunday, March 4<sup>th</sup>**, we will hold an **open Church Council meeting at 12:00 pm**, to invite your input on these questions. We will gather around the communion breakfast tables, with a member of the Church Council sitting at each table to record your responses and facilitate the conversation. Please come!

This open church council meeting is the next step in our process to discern priorities for our mission and ministry together for the next 3 years. It is also a response to the feedback we received from many of you regarding creating an open process that engages the wider congregation in the work that the church council does to plan for the ministry and mission of the church.

After the crisis we faced last fall, in which we made interim decisions to reduce staff hours in an effort to align our income with our expenses, the church council committed to use the first half of this year to develop a plan for moving forward. As part of this plan, we committed to develop a set of priorities for our ministry that best reflect our vision and values as a congregation. And, we committed to build a ministry budget that is balanced and sustainable, reflecting our vision, values, and commitment to responsible stewardship.

During the conversations we had last fall, many of you wanted to have your voices heard and to be included in this discernment opportunity. This is one such opportunity.

*Discerning Priorities Together continued...*

The plan is to receive your input on these questions so that the Church Council can prayerfully discern what priorities are emerging out of our responses. With these priorities, the Church Council leadership will then evaluate how our ministry structures can best reflect these priorities. For instance, in light of these priorities, we will ask questions such as, are we structured in such a way to best implement the priorities we have set? If not, what can we change in order to do so? We will look at the way our leadership is structured (both lay and staff) as we discern a way to grow and move our ministries forward; and, we will look at how our budget reflects and supports this work.

The church budget is not only a financial document but it is also—and most importantly—a spiritual document. As a spiritual document it reflects what is most important to our spiritual life and health as a church. One way we have sought to convey this in the past is by developing a narrative budget, which is different from a line-item budget but rather outlines and narrates how our gifts are utilized for mission and ministry. The Church Council intends to improve on this strategy by aligning our narrative budget and line-item budget with the vision, values, and priorities of our ministry and mission.

The scriptures remind us that, the church is like a body. Though the body is one, it has many parts, each with different functions and roles. Within the body, we are called to lead and serve in a variety of capacities. The Church Council and I recognize that everyone has an important role to play in moving our church forward. So, we are inviting your input to help us, as your leaders, lead faithfully in accordance with the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit fell upon the whole church, so each of us have the capacity to hear and to be led by the Spirit. That means, we are called to listen to one another for the guidance of the Holy Spirit. We therefore, pray and hope that, you will all join us in this conversation on March 4<sup>th</sup>.

We also recognize that we will have our communion breakfast guests that Sunday. If we do it well, I think it will be very moving and transformative to also hear from the voices of our guests who will be at the tables with us that Sunday. Since God is leading us to be in community with our neighbors, it will also be important to hear the perspectives of our neighbors about what they think is important work for the church to do. So, please come and help is with this holy work on March 4<sup>th</sup>.

## **A MESSAGE FROM THE CHURCH BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR**

I am writing today to give you a reminder about the changes in hours for myself and Debi Ritacco, our Church Secretary for the first 6 months of 2018. During this time, both Debi and I are working with reduced hours; Debi has gone from 35 hours to 30, and effective 2/19/18, I have gone from 40 hours to 30. As we work under this new model, there are changes taking place to enable us to be successful under this new structure; namely, some duties have or will be stopped, and some duties have transitioned to others. I am sharing the changes in my position to help eliminate ten hours of work:

Once Tim Murphy, our Building Superintendent, returns to work, our three custodians—Gerard Piscitelli, April Dylewicz, and Tom Friend will report to him. Tim and Debi will continue to report to me.

All internal meetings at Wesley that are non-fee related will be scheduled by Debi. Please contact her directly if you need to book any rooms so this information can be confirmed and added to our month calendars.

All supply ordering will be consolidated under Debi's position from items ordered in the past by me or Tim.

Volunteers will be the first to answer the doorbell, or the phone, Debi will be the next person, and I will be the third person. At this time, we are receiving assistance from Beth Maider and Emily Smith. Volunteers are always welcomed and appreciated, so if you are able to donate your time, please give us a call. I cannot stress enough how important these volunteers are to us being able to get our work done.

The Board of Trustees have been handling capital budget projects and issues over the past year or so, and they will be taking on a portion of the Memorial Gifts process.

The Staff Parish Relations Committee will take on any changes in Massachusetts state laws pertaining to human resources, analyzing their impact, and implementing any process changes. This will also include all decisions pertaining to health insurance vendors, related cost analysis, and implementations.

The Finance Committee will become more involved with the budget preparation, analysis of data, and the mailing of quarterly statements.

I will continue to do the basic Finance work which includes processing the weekly payroll, all donations and payments, and all bills and check requests. I will do the monthly and annual closing tasks, including the preparation of the Profit and Loss Statement and Balance Sheet for the Finance Committee. I will reconcile all of the accounts, and prepare records for audit. I will continue to oversee the accounts receivable function which

includes all parking customers and building renters under contract. The Board of Trustees will work with potential renters to prepare contracts and make any accommodations needed. I will process all benefit changes related to health insurance, 403b contributions, and the preparation of w2's and 1099's. I will do the reporting for all capital budget expenditures for Board of Trustee meetings.

As Pastor Shandi has communicated in prior Heralds and during all-church meetings the number of Heralds published each year will be transitioning from two to one per month. The Sunday bulletin is being consolidated to eliminate redundant information, and a new Computer Support Company, Machado Consulting, is providing superior computer support. These actions will reduce the amount of work done by Debi Ritacco.

Lastly, my schedule will be 9 to 5, Monday through Thursday. Debi will be working from 9 to 3:30 Monday through Friday. Please give us a call if you have any questions. Thank you for your support as we go through this transition.

## COME WITH ME: A LENTEN WORSHIP SERIES

In her book **Come With Me: Daily Living with a New Monastic Rule of Life**, Wendy Miller describes how, early in his ministry, Jesus forms a rhythm in his relationship with those who follow him. The rhythm includes three movements that are integral to the formation and transformation of disciples: coming to Jesus, being with Jesus and each other, and being sent out. This rhythm becomes a norm and a rule for the life of the disciples.

Wendy Miller then describes how, as United Methodists, we have adapted this rhythm into our baptismal and membership vows, whereby we covenant to be faithful to walk as disciples by our Prayers, Presence, Gifts, Service, and Witness. This year, the Lenten worship series will lead us to explore how we can enter more deeply into this rhythm and rule of life. We will examine how this five-fold rule expressed in our baptismal vows can be a living expression of the way of Jesus in the world. Jesus says, “Come with me. Come follow me.” So this Lent, we invite you to heed his call and respond to his invitation.

Below is a thematic outline for the series. We invite you to come journey with us.

**2/18** Lent 1: ***Baptism and Being Named***—We will reflect on the new name we receive with our baptism and how our name informs the journey to which Jesus invites us.

**2/25** Lent 2: ***Baptismal Covenant***—In this service will reflect on how our baptismal vows informs a new rhythm or pattern for living in the world.

**3/04** Lent 3: ***Prayer and the Baptismal Covenant***—in this service we will reflect on our prayer lives, and invite us to consider how we can settle into a new rhythm of prayer.

**3/11** Lent 4: ***Presence and the Baptismal Covenant***—in this service we will reflect on how Jesus is present to us and consider how we can be present to others in the world.

**3/18** Lent 5: ***Gifts and the Baptismal Covenant***—in this service we will reflect on the gifts God has blessed us with and consider how to bless others with these same gifts.

**3/25** Palm Sunday: ***Service and the Baptismal Covenant***—in this service we will reflect on how, through our gifts, we can revive the heart of service in our walk with Jesus.

**4/01** Easter: ***Witness and the Baptismal Covenant***—in this service we will point to a new Eastertide worship series in which we will further examine what it means to bear witness to resurrection life in the world.

## CHRISTIAN FORMATION AND DISCIPLESHIP

**During the Lenten season**, we will be using the book **“Come With Me”** by Wendy Miller. “Come With Me” serves as a vehicle for contemplation, reflection, and spiritual direction to discern what God is cultivating in our personal lives and in our neighborhoods.

Author Wendy Miller describes “Come With Me” in this way:

“Come With Me is designed to be a guide and a workbook, giving you the kind of map that can help with the inward and outward journey [of the Christian faith]. In its pages you will find guidance as you explore the landscape of your own life and soul, and as you engage with an outward journey, encountering people you may never have met or spent time with before—all kinds of people. That is the way of Jesus, tending our inner being, even as we are engaging with other people.”

We will be engaging with this book in our worship sermon series during Lent, and we will also offer two different times to be a part of small group journeying and discussions:

- \* **The 9:30 Adult Sunday School Class** (meeting in the John Wesley Room) will be using the “Come With Me” as a companion study to the weekly worship service. All are welcome to this small group reflection and discussion time.
- \* **On Tuesday Evenings in Lent [Feb. 20th—Mar. 27th]** all are invited to join in a simple supper followed by a time of small group reflection and discussion of “Come With Me.”

The evening will begin with a simple supper of soup, bread, and fruit at **5:45 p.m.**....followed by the small group time from **6:45-8 p.m.**

We hope that you will come and be a part of any or all of these opportunities to reflect on you faith journey and how to engage more fully with the Wesley family and our neighbors in offering our gifts, our prayers, our witness, and our service.

## NEW PLAN FOR HERALD MAILINGS

As you may know, the church is undergoing a discernment period to restructure our ministry and church operations in order to live into a goal of responsible stewardship. Many changes will be explored in the coming months, and some changes are already underway. One such change is in regards to the bi-weekly herald publishing.

**Beginning in April**, Wesley Church will publish one Herald a month. This move will help us to be good stewards in a few areas. First, the move will help us to be good stewards of resources in creation. We believe that a reduction in the paper we use is good for the environment. Second, we believe that this reduction will help us to be good financial stewards, since it will provide cost savings on paper, ink and postage. And third, we believe that this move will help us be good stewards of our staff time and gifts, particularly since we have reduced staff hours in all the full-time positions.

## DID YOU KNOW?

On the last Sunday prior to the start of Lent, Transfiguration Sunday, our Gospel reading from Mark told the story of Jesus' appearance becoming radiantly transformed in the presence of three of his disciples on a mountaintop. Throughout the Bible, mountains are used as symbols and metaphors, but given the nature of the topography of the Holy Land, it is not surprising that many of the actual sacred sites where individuals had encounters with God were mountains. The traditional identity of the Mount of Transfiguration was for many years thought to be **Mount Tabor**, although some scholars believe that **Mount Hermon** is a more likely site.

Moses and Elijah, each of whom appeared with Jesus at the Transfiguration, also had significant experiences on mountains. **Mount Horeb** or **Mount Sinai**, believed by some to be different names for the same place, was the site of Moses' encounter with God in the burning bush as well as where he spent time with God to receive the Ten Commandments. At the end of his life, Moses was given a view of the Promised Land from **Mount Nebo**. Elijah had a contest with the prophets of Baal on **Mount Carmel**.

Other mountains of significance mentioned in the Old Testament include **Mount Ararat** (actually a mountain range), where Noah's ark came to rest, and **Mount Moriah**, where Abraham was prepared to offer Isaac as a sacrifice.

In the New Testament many activities of Jesus are associated with mountains: he withdrew to mountains to be alone and pray, but mountains were also sites of his teaching and prophesying to his disciples. As we progress through Lent, Holy Week and beyond we will hear of several mountains. In addition to being a place where Jesus went to teach, the **Mount of Olives** is where Jesus was when he wept over Jerusalem prior to the Triumphal Entry, and he returned there to pray on the night of his betrayal. The Mount of Olives also was the site of the Ascension, forty days after the Resurrection. The site of the Crucifixion has been referred to as **Mount Calvary** since the sixth century, although in the Gospels it is referred to as a "place" but not specifically a mountain.

**Mount Zion**, the site of the pre-Israelite fortress of Jerusalem captured by David and eventually the place where the temple stood became synonymous with the city of Jerusalem. In the apocalyptic visions of Revelation, Mount Zion becomes the heavenly Jerusalem, a place of refuge, peace and joy and the eternal dwelling place of God and God's people.


