- What people in the wider community are in need of God's blessing? Who are those whose needs are being ignored, dismissed, and/or harmed by various public policies? What does it look like for us as a congregation to live as God's blessing, especially for people who are marginalized, in the community around us? How can we embody peace, justice, mercy, and righteousness in all that we say and do through our programs and ministries?
