Ash Wednesday 2023 at Wesley

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a season of reflection in which we are invited to deeper Christian discipleship. This year on Ash Wednesday, Wesley will provide several different times and ways for you to enter into the season of Lent. It is hoped that having multiple options with a flexible schedule will enable as many people as possible to mark the beginning of the Lenten journey in a meaningful way.

On Ash Wednesday, February 22, from 11am-1pm and 3pm-5pm Pastor Moo will offer distribution of ashes and Holy Communion at the wooden footbridge in the rear parking lot Should you wish to spend time in individual prayer and reflection either before or after receiving ashes and Communion outside, the sanctuary and chapel will be open during the same hours. The floor labyrinth along with materials for a guided walk to contemplate Lenten intentions will be available in the chapel.

Should you wish to participate in corporate worship there will be an evening service of imposition of ashes and communion in the sanctuary at 6:30pm. (This will be our first in-person Ash Wednesday service since 2020.) A light soup supper will be available in Brewer Hall at 6pm. You may also choose to walk the labyrinth in the chapel before or after the service.

It is our hope and prayer that the observance of Ash Wednesday will open the way for your spiritual pilgrimage through Lent.

Lenten Small Group Study

In the season of Lent many people take on an additional spiritual practice. One such practice is to participate in a seasonal small group study. During the six weeks of Lent Debbie O'Driscoll will facilitate a daytime online small group using the book *Lent in Plain Sight* by Jill J. Duffield. This devotional book considers ten everyday objects (dust, bread, a cross, coins, shoes, oil, coats, towels, thorns, and stones), looking at scriptural references to each object and using the object as a lens through which to consider aspects of the Lenten spiritual journey.

The intention is for the group to meet via Zoom on Wednesdays during Lent, either morning or afternoon, with the exact time to be determined based on what works best for those participating. Prevent Homelessness with Gift Cards

It's a simple idea with community-wide impact -- buy gift cards for your groceries or other shopping and help Worcester-area families stay in their homes! Working with the Central Mass. Housing Alliance, Wesley offers gift cards for sale each Sunday. A portion (anywhere from 2 to 10 percent) of the face value goes into a fund that helps families who are facing eviction. One rent check or utility bill payment from this fund can keep a family together in their home, rather than the upheaval of living in a shelter or on the street.

Right Place at the Right Time

When IHN used rooms in the church I connected with the leaders and families there. One day as I drove in the parking lot, their director Joanne was leaving. We both stopped and she told me their van had run out of gas, with families on board. She was on her way to help them, but she had no gas can. I knew where one was, so got it and took her and gas to the van way out on Grafton Street. It happens sometimes that I am at church just when I am needed... to unlock a door, give out some food, or find a requested item. And once to deliver gas.

DID YOU KNOW?

During the season of Lent we are called to repentance, and thus it is no surprise that the lectionary readings for Ash Wednesday each year include Psalm 51, which in the Christian tradition is one of seven psalms known as the *penitential psalms*. In the ancient church, the designation *penitential psalm* was first given to Psalm 51 alone. By the early 5th century St. Augustine of Hippo had given this designation to 4 psalms, and Cassiodorus in the 6th century finally had grouped all 7 of them together. In the Middle Ages these psalms were used as meditations before the service of penance. In the worship of the church the 7 penitential psalms were said at the end of the service of morning prayer and were also used on fast days. Their liturgical use during Lent was first ordered by Innocent III in the 13th century. They were frequently included in the famous illustrated books of hours and other devotional books of the medieval period from the 13th to 16th centuries.

Of the penitential psalms the two most well-known are probably Psalm 51, David's prayer for forgiveness and cleansing after being confronted by the prophet Nathan about his adultery with Bathsheba, and Psalm 130 from the collection of the "songs of ascent" (Ps 120-134) recited by pilgrims on their journey to Jerusalem. This psalm is a testimony of trust in the Lord even as the psalmist calls "out of the depths".

The remaining 5 penitential psalms include:

- Psalm 6 a prayer in time of severe illness
- Psalm 32 which expresses gratefulness for God's gift of forgiveness
- Psalm 38 a petition of David for relief from a painful serious illness, which he perceives as a "rebuke" from God. (Neither the specific occasion nor the illness are identified.)
- Psalm 102 a prayer of an individual in a time of great distress
- Psalm 143 a prayer for deliverance from the wicked and their evil ways

The psalmist in each of the penitential psalms not only reveals distress over sins but in the midst of physical and/or emotional suffering also expresses contrition as well as the hope of being restored to abundant life in God's grace.
