Beginning with Ash Wednesday, we have entered into the Season of Lent. Many of us are faithfully practicing the traditional triad of Lenten observances: prayer, almsgiving, and fasting. These are important religious principles that lead us to deep spiritual experiences. And these are also all great deeds in themselves that require huge efforts.

We may feel like we are achieving certain degree of spiritual goals, such as, fight against temptation and trial, and win. While this would be a meaningful and necessary progress in our journey through Lent, we need to remember the fundamental meaning and purpose of the Lenten observant. **Trust in God.** It may sound too simple and easy. But quite often this truth has been overlooked or neglected because it is the basic foundation of our life and faith. It is one of the common mistakes in human life: focusing on applications and secondary issues, everybody misses the necessity of constant re-commitment of ourselves to the basic truth.

This is not to say that Lenten observances are not important. But I want to remind you that prayer, almsgiving, and fasting are not the ends but the means of guiding us somewhere. Lent is often called the Season of Repentance. We also need to be reminded that repentance is not an end but a means.

The ashes we put on our forehead remind us that we are mortal, limited, and temporal beings. "Dust you are and to dust you shall return!" What comes next? "Repent! Believe in the Good News, and remember the Grace of Christ!"

So, repentance we take on should lead us to **re-commit ourselves to God**. Every practice we do, especially during Lent, should enable us to fully return to the Mercy and Love of God. I am praying that none of us get lost our ways return to God. **"Remember the Grace of Christ!"**

Lenten Small Group Study... In the season of Lent many people take on an additional spiritual practice. One such practice is to participate in a seasonal small group study. During the six weeks of Lent Debbie O'Driscoll will facilitate a daytime online small group using the book *Lent in Plain Sight* by Jill J. Duffield. This devotional book considers ten everyday objects (dust, bread, a cross, coins, shoes, oil, coats, towels, thorns, and stones), looking at scriptural references to each object and using the object as a lens through which to consider aspects of the Lenten spiritual journey.

Come choose a Sunday to help with card sales -- it takes a team to tackle a challenge as big (and fast-growing) as homelessness.



#### A God Moment by Judy Hoffman

As some of you may know I was sick recently and missed a week of worship. Many of you extended your concerns through my spouse, with cards, texts, and calls. All were appreciated. A very warm and sincere call was from a member who asked to pray with me. A very special God moment indeed.

## **DID YOU KNOW?**

The seasons of Lent and Easter are times during the liturgical year when we are especially likely to reflect on the meaning of the cross for our lives as Christians. Probably the most universally recognized symbol of the Christian faith even outside of the church, the cross is also the one symbol that is used in almost every tradition of Christian worship. It thus is a symbol that has become central to the identity of the church, but did you know that the cross did not play a prominent role in Christian worship until the 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup> Century? Prior to that time, it was not used because of what was felt to be a shameful association with crucifixion, which of course was the death penalty for the worst criminals. Although there is complete absence of representation of the crucifixion and overt representation of the cross in early Christian art such as the paintings of the catacombs in Rome, other earlier Christian symbols, such as the Chi-Rho and anchor of hope, incorporated crosses in a subtle and unobtrusive way.

Initially when used in worship the cross was not a stationary furnishing or symbol in worship spaces but was carried in processions and then placed behind or to the side of the altar or communion table during the worship service. Such processional crosses are still used in many denominations today. At Wesley we have a small processional cross which has on certain occasions been used to lead the procession for various festive worship services as a symbol that all Christians are followers of the cross.

The altar cross, which serves as the central furnishing of the altar (as in our sanctuary), is a later development (13<sup>th</sup> Century). It is believed to have evolved from the processional cross, as the shaft was removable from many processional crosses; after the procession the upper portion was removed and placed in a stand on the altar, where it then served as an altar cross during the worship service.

Other types of crosses in worship spaces include the pendant cross, which is suspended in the sanctuary of a church and the rood cross which is mounted on a beam high above the entrance to the chancel in some churches. The latter use is a symbol of the belief that the entrance to heaven must be by the way of the cross.

In the Protestant tradition, the cross is generally empty to symbolize the resurrection of Christ. Most of us are also familiar with the crucifix, with the figure of Christ on a cross, which is used especially in the Roman Catholic tradition. Early processional crosses did not have a figure of Christ on them, and the crucifix did not appear until the 5<sup>th</sup> Century. Initially crucifixes depicted Christ as alive with eyes open standing victoriously. The crucifix evolved throughout the Middle Ages and by the 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> Centuries, the figure of a suffering Christ was depicted more realistically. The crucifix remained a general symbol of Christianity until the time of the Reformation, when Protestants rejected the use of representational imagery, and again adopted the empty cross as a primary symbol.

There actually are more than 400 different variations on the basic shape of the cross! The most common, also one of the earliest of these shapes is the Latin cross such as we see in our sanctuary. It is an upright cross with the lower portion of the vertical twice as long as the upper part above the cross arm. The addition of a circle around the center of the cross is a symbol of eternity as well as of the worldwide kingdom of Jesus' final sovereignty.

As prominent and powerful a symbol as the cross is in Christian worship spaces, it is good for us to remind ourselves that in the setting of the worship space, it is considered a "secondary" liturgical furnishing which enhances the primary symbolism of the altar/communion table in terms of celebration of the Eucharist, one of the central acts of Christian worship.
