Recently we celebrated our centennial as a congregation. This blessed and joyous Easter-Pentecost Season and centennial celebration invite us to recall our mission as the people of the United Methodist Church: "The mission of the church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Our tagline 'Open hearts. Open minds. Open doors.' embraces who we are and how we seek to put our faith in action."

It is time to renew our commitment to this mission by asking: "How are we fulfilling our mission?" "Where is the Holy Spirit leading our congregation?" Our responses to these questions will be the first step of our visioning process that we approved last annual church conference.

How many hours do we spend on SNS? How many hours do we watch sports games? How about the other activities? If we cannot set aside at least 20-30 minutes each day to communicate with our God, perhaps our life is losing its meaning and direction now.

The love of God has been poured into us by the Holy Spirit. This love can change and empower the lives of those who receive it. However, its power in our lives and relationships depends upon whether we witness it in our daily lives. Our Lord Jesus clearly commanded us, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." How are we, empowered by God's love, witnessing it to those in need, especially the least of the least? Do people recognize us by our love?

We are called, first of all, to pray with perseverance and to witness God's love.

May we all respond faithfully and courageously!

#### Here's a Chance to Prevent Homelessness

It's a simple idea -- buy your groceries (or your coffee or toiletries) and help a local family stay in their home. You'll be joining area stores in contributing to a fund that gives grants to families facing eviction. One back rent payment, utility bill or storage unit fee can keep families out of the shelter system and all the disruption to their children's schooling.

Here's how it works: When you purchase gift cards from Big Y, Shaw's, Stop & Shop, CVS, Dunkin Donuts, Panera, Starbucks, Amazon, Target or TJ Maxx/Marshalls/Home Goods, a percentage of that card's value is donated by those stores to Central Mass. Housing Alliance. Families come to CMHA seeking assistance, and since this program began, hundreds of families have received aid.


### **Invitation to Father's Day Cookout at Dismas House**

### A God Moment by Betsy Pennino

The weeks between Memorial Day and July 4<sup>th</sup> are a good time to remember one of the great coincidences-which-was-more-than-just-a-coincidence: our 2<sup>nd</sup> President John Adams and 3<sup>rd</sup> President Thomas Jefferson died on the same day which was the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence! Adams had been a major promoter of winning freedom from England and had written the Massachusetts State Constitution which influenced the U.S. Constitution. Jefferson had written the Declaration of Independence. Both were Ambassadors to France and won French support during the Revolutionary War and its aftermath when there were no laws in place about paying war debts and collecting money through taxes.

Each was near death but wanted to live until the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of their grand experiment: it was unheard of in the 1700's that citizens could elect their leaders and government representatives and that people would have equal rights before the law. It took generations for the country to live up to the hopeful vision set forth in the Constitution.

On the morning of July 4, 1826, Thomas Jefferson was near death at Monticello and asked, "is it the 4<sup>th</sup> yet?" John Adams also hovered near death in his Quincy, MA home. When he died, his last words were, "Thomas Jefferson survives." Jefferson had actually died 5 hours before that, but the fastest news could move then was on horseback. Five years later, the 5<sup>th</sup> American President, James Monroe, also died on July 4th.

## 2023 UWF Mission Recognition Award Goes to Judy Hoffman

Every year, Wesley's unit of United Women in Faith seeks to honor a woman whose work among us has often gone unnoticed or unheralded.

This year we honor someone who – as nearly every nomination noted – is always willing to help. And often, she doesn't need to be asked, she just sees something that needs doing, and does it!

One nominator praised "her unconditional service to Wesley." But it's not just her service we want to recognize, it's her quiet ways of taking action or suggesting an approach that helps others grow in their faith.



By New England standards, she's a relative newcomer to Worcester. Her arrival at Wesley brought new strength and energy to our congregation.

She volunteered at the community supper held after she first came to church and nearly every supper we've held since.

A natural connector, Judy is often the person to welcome newcomers. Then she promptly introduces them to someone she thinks they'd like to know. When refugees from Afghanistan needed warm clothes, she welcomed them too, by helping with the coat ministry.

Her experience in other churches has meant she brings new ideas for us to try. New ways to welcome visitors – and their children in need of activities in the pews, new ways to welcome new pastors, and remind our college students and healthcare workers that their Wesley family cares about them.

You can't join a Methodist Church and not serve – at some point – on a committee, and Judy has already co-led two – Hospitality and SPRC. She's also led Bible studies together with her husband, retired pastor Jim Hoffman.

What can seem like her non-stop service means she can be among the last to leave the building on a given Sunday.

# **DID YOU KNOW?**

We recently celebrated the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the merger of two Methodist congregations, Grace Church and Trinity Church to form the congregation which subsequently relocated to 114 Main St. Our church takes its name, *Wesley* United Methodist Church, from the family name of the founders of the Methodist movement, John, and Charles Wesley. Did you know that one of the stained glass windows in the sanctuary is devoted to this family? It is the window that is facing you on the right as you look up into the North balcony (pulpit side) from the sanctuary floor. (In fact, all the windows in this balcony are portrayals of various leaders of Methodism, rather than Biblical figures as depicted in the windows in the upper walls of the main part of the nave.)

Interestingly, the central figure in the window is neither John nor Charles but their mother Susannah. The booklet *The Windows at Wesley Methodist Church, Worcester, Massachusetts* explains that Susannah Wesley "must be included because of her unusual molding influence on their lives." In the lower medallion beneath her she is shown teaching John as a young child representing "all the devoted instruction of her children."

Charles Wesley is depicted in the right lancet of the window with a pen and scroll of music and is shown composing a hymn in the medallion below. He wrote at least 6,500 hymns, and is known as the most prominent hymn writer of the 18<sup>th</sup> century.

In the lancet on the left, John Wesley is depicted holding a closed book, and in the medallion below, he is shown preaching to miners. After the Aldersgate experience (the anniversary of which is May 24) in which he "felt his heart strangely warmed," he spent the rest of his life as an itinerant preacher. What is somewhat lesser known about John is that he also made significant contributions to hymnody as well. He was the compiler of *A Collection of Psalms and Hymns*, 1737, the first English hymnbook for use in worship.
