- What is your individual role and responsibility in reflecting God's compassion and justice to all whom you encounter, whether neighbor, stranger, and even "enemy"? What does it mean to strive for justice and peace among all people? How can we as a congregation, through our programs and ministries, more fully embrace causes of justice, truth, liberation, and freedom, especially for those who are marginalized and oppressed? How can we be agents of God's power on behalf of the vulnerable and weak?
- What histories, cultures, communities, places, and people have contributed to your identity? In what ways do you feel connected to people around the globe? What does it mean to embrace diverse voices, cultures beyond your own? What might a global perspective require of the church in general and our congregation in particular in matters of social and environmental justice? What does it mean for us collectively as a congregation to serve as disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world?
