Questions for Reflection —

What does it look like for us to cultivate and live according to the values of God's kin-dom? How can we as a congregation become an embodied expression of Christ's love, radical welcome, healing, and reconciliation?
- How/when have you experienced the presence of both weeds and wheat within the field that is your heart and your interior life? What do you need in order to acknowledge and confront the mixture of wheat and weeds presently within you? What is it that chokes and entangles your spiritual life? What habits, practices, and choices will help you to cultivate your potential to engage in acts of love, justice, mercy, kindness? How might you sow good seed among family, friends, neighbors, and co-workers/classmates?
- What does it look like for you to "shine like the sun"? How do your actions and words reflect what is holy and Godly back to the world? What unique light is yours that God is calling you to shine forth in your daily encounters? What does it mean for us as a congregation to "shine like the sun"? How can we share the light of Christ in a world filled with so much darkness?
