The Bell Tolls for Us

English poet John Donne (1572-1631) penned these words that ring with truth today:

Each man's death diminishes me, For I am involved in mankind. Therefore, send not to know for Whom the bell tolls, it tolls for thee.



Another hate crime, the murder of three African Americans at the hands of a white supremist armed with an AR 15 semi-automatic weapon, happened on Saturday in Jacksonville, Florida.

Public outcry seems to be a whimper. We are becoming so used to our culture of violence and hatred that it barely makes the news anymore. I can only reflect on how much more solidarity we need as a nation so that when our own people are murdered our collective voices rise loudly in unison to decry the horror.

I call all of us to remember these constant shootings are personal. These are crimes against humanity, and that is us. The slain are your siblings, your neighbors, your beloved.

During World War II as the Nazis were invading Europe and murdering and incarcerating Jews, the American public, for the most part, ignored the Holocaust. The United States turned back a ship full of Jewish people who were trying to escape death.

Denmark was different; the Danes stood in solidarity and the Jewish people were protected in a national rescue effort. They smuggled 7,000 Jews to safety in Sweden; another 500 who were deported by the Nazis were sent to a ghetto in Bohemia where the Danes continued to protect and advocate for them.

Why did they do this? They saw their Jewish citizens as their people, their family. We need more of this in our country.

It was 60 years ago today that Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. gave his iconic "I Have a Dream" speech at the National Mall in Washington, D.C., before a crowd of 250,000 people.

There was an event in Washington this past Saturday commemorating this, the most important racial justice demonstration in U.S. history.

Yolanda King, Dr. King's 15-year-old granddaughter, spoke:

"Today, racism is still with us. Poverty is still with us. And now gun violence has come for our places of worship, our schools and our shopping centers."

The beloved community that we claim to be as Christians needs to speak out (and advocate and legislate) when any member of our human family is being oppressed and murdered.

Let us grieve the death of each one. It is our own.

Let us individually check our souls for racism and implicit bias.

Let us collectively own the racist history of this country and name freely that "liberty and justice for *all*" is still a long way off.

Until everyone is free, none of us is truly free.

The bell tolls for all of us.

Here's a Chance to Prevent Homelessness

It's a simple idea -- buy your groceries (or your coffee or toiletries) and help a local family stay in their home. You'll be joining area stores in contributing to a fund that gives grants to families facing eviction. One back rent payment, utility bill or storage unit fee can keep families out of the shelter system and all the disruption to their children's schooling.

Here's how it works: When you purchase gift cards from Big Y, Shaw's, Stop & Shop, CVS, Dunkin Donuts, Panera, Starbucks, Amazon, Target or TJ Maxx/Marshalls/Home Goods, a percentage of that card's value is donated by those stores to Central Mass. Housing Alliance. Families come to CMHA seeking assistance, and since this program began, hundreds of families have received aid.

Look for the birdhouse in Brewer Hall -- at a table near the stage -- after church services. Cards are for sale every Sunday and by email to AChis4788@aol.com. September orders will be due by September 11 for pickup on September 17.

Come choose a Sunday to help with card sales -- it takes a team to tackle a challenge as big (and fast-growing) as homelessness.

DID YOU KNOW?

In our recent congregational music survey, the organ was second only to congregational singing of hymns in being considered by respondents as essential to our musical offerings in worship. The high regard for the role of the organ in the worship of our congregation is a continuous thread in the history of our congregation. A. Leslie Jacobs, Wesley's first Minister of Music, came to Worcester in 1926 before the building of the church was completed to help select the specifications for the E.M. Skinner organ that was to be built in the sanctuary.

Since our church thus has had a large pipe organ that was in place before the dedication of the church, we probably tend to take it for granted that the organ plays such a prominent role in our worship services. Did you ever wonder how the organ came to be one of the main musical instruments used in churches? Believe it or not, in ancient times the early predecessors of the organ as we know it now were very much associated not with worship, but with secular entertainment such as theater. Because of these associations, the writings of the early church contain objections to the use of the organ (and other musical instruments) in worship.

It is unclear when the organ first began to be used in Christian rituals. It is known that there were organs in churches in Europe as early as the 8th C, but it is uncertain if they were used in any way that was connected to liturgy. (One speculation is that they may have been used to teach music.) By the 10th C there are records of organs (and bells) being used at least for special occasions by monastic communities. By that time there were also written descriptions of large loud organs located in churches throughout most of Western Europe. It is not until the 12th C, however, that the organ clearly was serving a defined liturgical function; by the 15th C its use in worship was widely accepted.

In the Roman Catholic tradition, the organ assumed a very central role in the celebration of the mass, with the playing of organ pieces called versets, based on chant, often substituting for or alternating with the singing of the chant. In a similar way, after the Reformation, in the Protestant Lutheran tradition the organ was used in alternation with the choir and congregation in the singing of hymns, and by the early 17^{th} C eventually came to actually accompany the singing. The Calvinists, on the other hand, removed organs from their churches thinking that the use of the organ prevented the active participation of the congregation in worship. Similarly, the Puritans in England destroyed organs during the English civil war, but this trend was reversed during the Restoration era. Finally, the "Modern Revival" of the organ which began with the Romanticists of the mid- 19^{th} C, led to the widespread acceptance of the organ as a means to support the large group singing that is an essential part of Christian worship.

In addition to hymns, the vast musical literature for the organ written over the centuries is filled with pieces written for use in Christian worship. Often these pieces are based on hymn tunes, liturgical chant, and/or inspired by scripture texts. Of course, even pieces not written with a specific liturgical theme can add to our worship as sources for inspiration, reflection, and meditation as well as expressions of God's gift of creativity.
