

## **Remembering Joy**

Several years ago, I was privileged to be a part of the ecumenical dialog team that engaged in conversation with representatives from the Roman Catholic Church. For four years, United Methodist and Roman Catholic laity and clergy, including two bishops, met together to share their perspectives and theologies.

Together this team crafted several liturgies that could be used during the holy seasons of the church year, and we celebrated our shared ministry and theology of justice and compassion. Ecumenical conversations are important and lifegiving. Learning about Roman Catholicism's traditions and distinct theology deepened my understanding of faith.

One of their traditions that remains with me is the celebration of Laetare Sunday on the fourth Sunday in Lent. The Latin word "laetare" means "rejoice." Isaiah 66:10 proclaims, "Rejoice with Jerusalem, and be glad for her, all you who love her; rejoice with her in joy." On that Sunday, the priorite wear pink (reso) vestmen

The fourth Sunday of Lent is the halfway point between Ash Wednesday and Easter. The early church prepared candidates for baptism at the Easter Vigil during the season of Lent. It was a time of penitence and self-examination.

The color purple, used during Advent and Lent, is symbolic of this time of repentance and reckoning with one's mortality. On this day, the candidates for baptism were given the Apostles' Creed for the first time. It taught them about the joyful promise of the "communion of the saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body and life everlasting."

The fourth Sunday of Lent is a time of refreshment and celebration within this season of Lenten austerity. Pink symbolizes joy and love as we anticipate Christ's resurrection. Through the years, there have been various expressions of jubilation on this special Sunday, such as weddings, baptism remembrances, the eating of treats and fruitcake, and the decoration of fountains with flowers and garlands.

In Protestant circles we have not officially caught on to the idea of Laetare Sunday. We have made a connection on the third Sunday of Advent with the pink candle on the Advent wreath. That is known as Gaudete Sunday in the Roman Catholic tradition. I am holding out hope Laetare Sunday will become yet another shared tradition in the future.

Until then, what we can take from this is a reminder of the importance of joy, not only on special Sundays in Lent and Advent, but throughout our lives. The Book of Nehemiah reminds us, "The joy of the Lord is our strength." (Nehemiah 8:10).

Undoubtedly the world is full of terrible events that challenge, threaten, and perplex us. We can be filled with fear and despair, or we can choose joy. Joy is an act of resistance, an affirmation of faith in a God who triumphs over hate, evil and death, and who will restore all things.

Joy means having hope in the midst of despair and having love for even the most despicable, knowing that "love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things." (I Corinthians 13:7)

This fourth Sunday of Lent, carry that joy in your heart (and maybe wear some pink). Take time to rejoice during this season of solemnity. Anticipate the Easter to come by bringing joy to someone to whom love is a stranger — that includes taking a special offering for UMCOR at your church, so relief efforts can be enhanced and people in need across this globe might have the joy of restoration (<u>UMCOR Sunday is March 10</u>).

Fast forward to January, a very cold night, I finally convinced Annie to stay at my house and out of the cold. She stayed with me for 4 nights, then another person opened their home to her for 4 nights over the weekend. From there, between generous people paying for hotel rooms or opening their homes, she and Patches were out of the cold. At the end of January, Annie and Patches came back and stayed with me for 2 weeks while the apartment she had found was finished and inspected.

Recently while helping Annie with things for her apartment, she received a text message from Chris asking if she could check on the car and cats at her house. Apparently, Chris fell and broke her shoulder and was in the hospital. So, we took a ride to Chris's house. While there I pulled the trash cans up from the street and watered her plants while Annie cleaned up after the cats and made sure the food and water was refilled.

Annie didn't know Chris before last summer when she let Annie store her belongings in the garage. Chris took in Annie's cat while she and the dog lived in her van.

All these acts of kindness... God was there for Annie in her time of need; and now Annie is there for Chris while she needs help. God moments at their finest.

# Growing in God's Mission

## DID YOU KNOW?

At this point we are now a couple of weeks into our journey through the liturgical season of Lent, a period of forty days (not including Sundays) of preparation for Easter, beginning with Ash Wednesday. In fact, in several languages the days of Lent are referred to as "The Forty". Did you ever wonder about the significance of the number *forty* in this context? Various numbers are used in the Bible, often with symbolic meaning, and a period of forty days or years is a common and important reference. Forty is often used as a round number that implies a relatively long time. It also connotes a fullness of time, in the sense that it is the time necessary to attain fulfillment e.g. of a prophecy. Most often it is associated with hardship, affliction and a time of testing or judgment.


The number forty also has strong Biblical associations with a time of preparation. Certainly Jesus' preparation for ministry by fasting for forty days in the wilderness is one of the main reasons that Lent consists of forty days, but the Bible is full of other references to the number forty. According to Laurence Hull Stookey in *Calendar: Christ's Time for the Church*:

"In Biblical terms forty is a round number symbolizing fullness—a span of time sufficient to accomplish what needs to take place; as such the number is used frequently and becomes a kind of shorthand for much of sacred history. Rain fell in Noah's time for forty days and nights; for this same period of time Moses and Elijah (who represent respectively the Law and the Prophets) dwelt at Horeb; for forty days Jesus endured temptation in the wilderness and later for the same period was revealed to the disciples after the resurrection. Nineveh was given forty days in which to repent. For forty years Israel wandered in the wilderness prior to admission into the promised land. Eli was a judge over Israel for forty years, and Saul, David, and Solomon are reported to have had reigns of forty years each."

In the New Testament, Jesus' experience of forty days in the desert wilderness after his baptism and prior to the start of his ministry are often seen as a recapitulation of Israel's forty years in the wilderness, but they also were a time of testing and preparation for his ministry. Each year as we live through the Forty Days of Lent we too are called to self-assessment and self-examination of our own call to Christian discipleship. As we continue our Lenten journey may this period of devotion and spiritual discipline be for each of us a "sufficient time" for us to prepare not only for our celebration of Easter but also to ponder the endless possibilities for renewal offered to us as we move forward to live into God's call in our lives, both in our individual lives and in the corporate life of our congregation.
