A God Moment from Nancy Cook

I recently pulled into a gas station to get an inspection sticker. I stopped in front of the inspection bay and saw a man inside kneeling on the floor and looking down at something. He soon sat back, then bent forward. When he rocked back again, I realized he was saying his midday prayers to Allah.

When he was finished, he put away his mat and came to wait on me. He thanked me for waiting.

It occurred to me that we should all pause during the day to say a prayer to the one God.

DID YOU KNOW?

During the opening hymn each week our worship service includes a procession of the choirs to the chancel steps. According to *The New Westminster Dictionary of Liturgy and Worship*, a procession is "a planned movement of a group of people from one place to another for some specific religious purpose, often to the accompaniment of singing and music". In general, processions serve a very practical function in worship which is the movement of people (and objects) to the site of liturgical participation. However, the procession can serve as a strong symbol as well.


The Bible has many references to processions, the most regular of which occur as part of the formal worship at the temple in Jerusalem. The Old Testament refers to political and military processions as well as religious processions. In terms of processions in the context of Christian worship, some of the earliest evidence for processions in the church is found in reports from the 4th century which describe pilgrimages to sacred sites in Jerusalem during the rites of Holy Week. In the history of the church, there is also a tradition of public processions which can serve not only as acts of pilgrimage but also as acts of witness. There are some traditions in which processions involve special steps and choreography resulting in a form of religious dance.

There are many other processions that occur not only in the context of usual Sunday morning worship but also in relation to special rites of the church: the procession to the font at baptism; the offertory procession; the procession of the bridal party to the altar at a wedding; the procession of the casket to the front of the church at a funeral. We can also think of our coming forward to receive communion as a congregational procession, which enables us to engage not only our spirits but also our physical bodies as we offer ourselves to serve and praise God. As we participate in various movements of worship, may we always be reminded that we do indeed worship with all that we are—hearts, souls, minds, and bodies.
