Music Notes for the Bulletin

Phillips Brooks (1835-1893) wrote this beloved Christmas hymn for the Sunday school children at his Philadelphia parish, Holy Trinity Church, following a pilgrimage to Bethlehem in 1865, according to British hymnologist J. R. Watson. The hymn was printed on an informal leaflet in December 1868 and then appeared in *The Sunday School Hymnal* in 1871.

In the United States, the hymn is generally sung to its original tune, ST. LOUIS by Louis H. Redner (1931-1908), a wealthy real estate broker who served as a church organist for his avocation. *UM Hymnal* editor Carlton Young notes that Redner "increased Sunday school attendance at Holy Trinity Episcopal, where Phillips Brooks was rector, from thirty-six to over one thousand during his nineteen years as superintendent." According to the story, Brooks traveled on horseback between Jerusalem and Bethlehem on Christmas Eve. "Before dark we rode out of town to the field where they say the shepherds saw the star. It is a fenced piece of ground with a cave in it, in which, strangely enough, they put the shepherds… Somewhere in those fields we rode through, the shepherds must have been. As we passed, the shepherds were still 'keeping watch over their flocks,' or leading them home to fold."

Dr. Watson sums it up well: "Not only does the hymn beautifully describe the little town asleep in the December night; it also gracefully modulates from a description of Christmas into an examination of the meaning of Christmas: first in its encouragement of charity and faith, and then into the coming of Christ into the human heart."


Recommended Items:

We both have been moved by seeing woods where just one tree has Christmas lights, so we've been decorating one evergreen in the woods behind our house. We always put two strings of lights around the very top to create a sense of starlight. Bruce put the lights on in 2023 and then I went out to look at them. I saw the usual jumble of lights & wires near the top. Yet when I looked out after dark, the jumble had become a perfect 5-point star! And it stayed there for weeks while other strings of lights were jostled about by strong windstorms.

I often notice the hazy colors that are created by sunlight streaming through Wesley's stained glass. They appear on the balcony wall to the left of the chancel. On November 3rd, I noticed more blue than usual as we started the readings for communion. I went forward to receive communion and returned to my seat. Immediately I looked up and saw that the blues had organized into two stripes. They extended almost the width of the wall. Above the left side of the stripes was a red field with a burst of gold in it. An American flag with blue instead of red & white stripes, red where the blue field with stars usually is, and a flash of gold instead of the 50 stars. It was two days before the 2024 election, and I had hopes for what the meaning might be. Later, I decided it was a sign that God would still bless the United States of America. DID YOU KNOW?

The visual environment of our sanctuary during the Advent/Christmas season includes a nativity scene or crèche. Many of us also display crèche scenes in our homes during this season. The word *crèche* is from French, meaning manger or crib, and refers to a representation of the scene in the stable at Bethlehem, and traditionally includes the Holy Family—the infant Jesus with Mary and Joseph—surrounded by animals, shepherds, and the Magi.


The earliest representations of the birth of Christ date from the 4th century in the form of paintings—one in the catacombs of Rome and another on a sarcophagus. However, representations of the crib or manger itself have been used in churches since antiquity, an important part of the early Christmas ritual having been the celebration of the Mass over a manger in which the consecrated host (bread for Communion) was laid. The widespread use of the Christmas crib is attributed to St. Francis of Assisi, who was said to have celebrated Midnight Mass in 1223 in a stable where people and live animals reenacted the entire Nativity scene. By the 16th century it became common for there to be crèche scenes in homes as well as in churches.

In terms of the iconography (symbolism) of the Nativity scene, it is interesting to note that in the Western tradition, Mary usually is depicted seated, holding the Baby Jesus, or kneeling at the manger in a posture of adoration. In the Eastern tradition, on the other hand, Mary is usually depicted lying down as having just given birth, thus stressing the reality of Jesus' human birth. Although depictions of animals such as the ox and the donkey have appeared in pictures of the Nativity as early as the 4th century, they are not mentioned in the New Testament. Their inclusion in the scene is related to Old Testament passages that foretell the birth of Christ, including Isaiah 1:3. Other elements of the scene, such as the shepherds and wise men, are mentioned in the New Testament gospel narratives of the birth of Jesus.

While creches are often display throughout the Advent season leading up to Christmas, in many traditions the figure of the Baby Jesus is not placed in the manger until Christmas Day. It is also often a custom for the figures of the Magi to be displayed at some distance and then begin their approach after the appearance of the star on Christmas, and to arrive at the stable on Epiphany. The secular world moves on quickly once Christmas Day has come, but in the church, Christmas Day is just the beginning of the Twelve Days of Christmas, and our Christmas season does not end until the Magi arrives at the manger as we celebrate Epiphany.
