God Moment from Lorraine Kronberg

A God Moment - - You are my Sunshine

It has been almost four years since I moved to Kingsport, Tennessee. I have found a home here with my daughter Kris and her family. It was not an easy decision to make because I had lived in Worcester for most of my life and attended Wesley for all those years. Music has been something I have enjoyed from a young child. My husband George and I sang in the Wesley Choir for more than 50 years. I have such wonderful, wonderful memories of those years with my dear friend LeRoy Hanson. The other group I miss is the "Sunshine Girls" and our singing at nursing homes and for shut-ins.

My new church is Harvest Community Church where my daughter is an associate pastor. I love everything about Harvest and singing only praise music with our very talented band. But I do miss singing hymns which I have loved since I sang them with my grandmother at St. James Methodist Church in Springfield MA as a child. Once every few months I attend Crossroads Methodist for their traditional service. A few weeks ago, I needed my 'hymn fix' and went to the 9:00 service where two of the hymns we sang were "Precious Lord, take my Hand', and 'The Hymn of Promise'.

After the service a very friendly woman who had played the Prelude of hymns on the piano that morning reached out to me. She asked if I would like to join a singing group that met at the Senior Center every week to sing hymns with others who love to sing. Well, I thought it over and went on Tuesday. I had a wonderful morning and met such lovely people. At the end of the morning Amy announced which nursing home they would be singing at on Thursday. Surprise! They sing at a different nursing home every week. She gave me a binder with over 100 hymns to keep and bring with me.

Thursday morning, I drove to the Holston Nursing Home and joined the other members who were going to sing that day. I was given the list of hymns for the morning. After an opening prayer we stood to sing our first song which was not on the list. It was "You are my Sunshine" which the Sunshine girls always sang at the beginning of their programs. I felt my heart open up and knew that God had brought me to this group to fill a place in my life that had been empty. What a joy! On Tuesday and Thursday mornings I will be singing the hymns and remembering the music and friends I loved at Wesley.

DID YOU KNOW?

Our worship on Epiphany Sunday included hearing the story from the Gospel of Matthew of the Magi's following a star to the birthplace of Jesus in Bethlehem, where they worshiped him and offered gifts to him. Throughout Advent and into Christmas and Epiphany the image of stars has been prominent in our sanctuary. Several different types of stars are found on the Chrismon tree.

Although the star that led the wise men to Jesus is the star of the Bible with which we are most familiar, there are many more references to stars throughout the Old and New Testaments. Some of these references are to the stars as heavenly bodies and as part of creation that includes images of transcendence and glory. Stars also are used as symbols of people, culminating in the image of the ascended Christ as the "bright morning star" of the book of Revelation.

The imagery of stars is also found in hymnody. A more contemporary hymn which uses the symbolism of a star for Jesus is "Star-Child" (*TFWS* 2095). During our Christmas Lessons and Carols we sang selected stanzas of that hymn. Dean McIntyre of the General Board of Discipleship explains the somewhat challenging text of this hymn in the following way¹:

Each verse begins with paired images followed by a short description:

- "Star-Child, earth-Child": The capitalized Child refers specifically to Jesus, son of God the creator of the universe, yet born on earth fully human; juxtaposes images of the Jesus of heaven and the Jesus of earth, both divine and human, a "go-between" or intercessor between God and humans.
- "Street child, beat child": There are people -- children and adults -- without homes and families, living on the streets, in the cold, beaten down by life's circumstances, "no place left to go."
- "Grown child, old child": Even older people with a lifetime of memories, are children of God.
- "Spared child, spoiled child": There are people of privilege and comfort, spared the struggle of the streets, spoiled by all that they have, yet "wanting more."
- "Hope-for-peace Child": Jesus born on earth is a "stupendous sign" from God that we can hope for peace.

Each verse continues with a second pair of images and a second short description:


- "love Child, Christ Child": Again capitalized, referring to Jesus. As "heaven's lightning rod," Jesus is God's means of entering into our human, earthly existence, quickly, dramatically, powerfully, as lightning in a storm.
- "hurt child, used child": As with its paired "street" and "beat child," there are those among us on the edges of society, people we may not even want to know or acknowledge.
- "sad child, lost child": There are those who suffer and hurt, have no direction, no goal, no joy, whose life stories are "told in tears."
- "wise child, faith child": And there are people whose lives have led them to maturity and wisdom in the faith.
- "down-to-earth Child": Amid all these images of humans, good images and unfortunate images,
 Jesus, as the divine star-Child, has come to earth to live among us and in us. He is the bright "Star of stars that shine."

As images of mystery that demonstrate God's awe-inspiring creativity, stars help to proclaim the ways God comes to us. The refrain of the hymn reminds us that there are some people who have never experienced the joy of Christmas. As McIntyre observes, "The prayer that this year Christmas will come to all is a prayer that everyone will know, recognize, and experience the coming of the Christ child in the many and varied circumstances of their lives." As we move from Christmas and Epiphany, may the way we live our lives shine the light of Christ, the true Star of Christmas, into the world.
